Students that have completed the above courses have met 12 of the 24 science credits needed for the RN to BSN/MSN program at the University of Delaware. If the total credits are still less than 24, students may choose courses from any of the 5 science categories to reach the total of 24. The remaining non nursing support courses are as follows:

 Multicultural Course Requirement- one approved course must stress multicultural, ethics, or gender related content. This may be fulfilled through a required or elective course.

Graduates from Sullivan County Community College's AD Nursing Program will receive 30 nursing credits for their successful completion of the registered nursing licensure exam. **This matrix is to be used as an example of possible transfer credit.** Official transfer credit is determined at time of application to the program.
