Students that have completed the above courses have met 12 of the 24 science credits needed for the RN to BSN/MSN program at the University of Delaware. Additional science requirements would include a general Biology (suggested BIO 105), Chemistry (suggested CHE 103) and Nutrition (suggested CHE 110).

The remaining prerequisites are as follows:

- Statistics 200 or equivalent
- *Restricted Elective (3 credits)
- Free Electives (15 credits)- 4 met with above curriculum and 1 extra will be needed to make up for the 1 science credit missing from 24.
- Multicultural Course Requirement- one approved course must stress multicultural, ethics, or gender related content. This may be fulfilled through a required or elective course.

Graduates from Ulster County Community College's AD Nursing Program will receive 30 nursing credits for their successful completion of the registered nursing licensure exam. **This matrix is to be used as an example of possible transfer credit.** Official transfer credit is determined at time of application to the program.
