10 Questions for the Dalai Lama: one man's journey through the northern Himalayas	85 minutes	2006	DVD; This film examines some of the fundamental questions of our time by weaving together observations from his own journeys throughout India and the Middle East, and the wisdom of an extraordinary spiritual leader, the Dalai Lama.
14 Wonders of the World: Ancient & New, The: The Definitive Collection of the World's Great Wonders	160 minutes	2008	DVD; Experience the awe-inspiring splendor of some of the most magnificent works of humankind now designated as the New 7 Wonders including: The Great Wall of China, Petra in Jordan, The Statue of Christ the Redeemer in Brazil, Machu Picchu in Peru, Chichen Itza pyramid in Mexico, The Colosseum in Rome, and The Taj Mahal in India.
1877: The Grand Army of Starvation	30 min.	1987	In the summer of 1877, a nationwide upheaval brought the US to a standstill. 80,00 railroad workers stopped work. Thousands of others soon followed suit- it was America's first national strike and marked the beginning of a new era of industrial conflict and change. This tape examines the conditions that brought about the strike and its aftermath.
1900 House, The	240 minutes	2000	VHS; Viewers time-travel vicariously in this four-part "docu-soap" that transplants a modern family from 1999 to 1900. The series clearly evinces the radical changes in domestic life wrought by the scientific and technological innovations of the last 100 years. The Bowler family are taken back in time to the spring of 1900 in Greenwich, a suburb of London, England. For 3 months, they live as a family in 1900 would have lived.
1940's House	3 hours	2000	DVD; One modern family takes on the challenge of domestic life on Britain's home front. This time travel experiment covers the period from the outbreak in 1939 to Victory Day in 1945, compressing the the events of six wartime years into two months.
1964 World's Fair, The	58 minutes	1996	DVD; The 1964 New York World's Fair was planned amid the optimism of the late 1950's, but the Fair's two year run often mirrored the chaos of the 1960's. The fair was a brawling, costly and altogether chaotic event, but few of the 52 million people who attended noticed. It is mainly about fairgoers who hope for the future.
2001: A Space Odyssey (25th Anniversary edition)	139min	1968	Stanley Kubrick explores the future of space travel, the possibility of extraterrestrial life, and man's place in the universe.

20th Century: Volume 1- The Shah of Iran and the Iran Hostage Crisis Camelot and Chappaquiddick	120 minutes	1994	VHS; From backer of the Shah to enemy of the Ayatollah, America's relationship with Iran soured into 444 days of hostage terror. For a country whose first family was named Kennedy, the 60's began the magic and promise of Camelot and ended with the scandal and disillusionment of Chappaquiddick.
42 Up	134 minutes	1999	VHS; In 1964, a film crew interviewed seven-year-old English kids: five or six from privilege, a Yorkshire farm lad, East-End girls, and boys from a children's home. Every seven years, Michael Apted re-interviews those willing. At 42, careers are stuck or flourishing; marriages are strong, shaky, or over. They're dealing with parents' dying, and children coming-of-age.
42nd Street	89 min	1933	The first Busby Berkley musical, 42nd Street is the classic story of the understudy who gets a big break and outshines the star.
45/85: America and the World since WWII Volume III, 1961-1975	52min	1986	Ted Koppel examines one of America's most turbulent decades. Beginning with the Kennedy era, the film traces the steps that led to the Bay of pigs and the Cuban Missile Crisis. Also covers LBJ's agenda social change, Nixon's election and resignation after Watergate, and a nation headed for a gas crisis.
60 Minutes - Death of a General	13 minutes	2006	DVD; Chief Warrant Officer Lewis Welshofer, who was convicted in the death of an Iraqi major general during an interrogation, tells Scott Pelley that his interrogation wasn't out of the ordinary. Welshofer says the technique he used was sanctioned, and that doing anything less would have jeopardized the lives of American soldiers.
60 Minutes - Echo Boomers	14 minutes	2004	DVD; Meet the "echo boomers" the children of the biggest generation in American history, the baby boomers. Born between 1980 and the early 1990's, the 80 million echo boomers are already having a huge impact on the economy.
60 Minutes - John Murtha	14 minutes	2006	DVD; One of the strongest voices of dissent on the Iraq War speaks out. Seventy-three-year-old Rep. John Murtha (D-PA), a decorated war hero from Vietnam and Korea, thinks Congress will begin withdrawing US troops from Iraq by the end of the year.
60 Minutes - Rendition	13 minutes	2005	DVD; Scott Pelley investigates 'rendition' the alleged CIA practice of abducting terror suspects and sending them to countries where interrogators are known to use torture. Khaled el- Masri, a car salesman from Germany, tells his story of kidnapping, imprisonment, and interrogation.

60 Minutes - The Court - Martial of Willie Brand	14 minutes	2006	DVD; Willie Brand, a guard at a US military prison in Bagram, Afghanistan, was court-martialed and convicted for assaulting and maiming two Afghan prisoners who later died. Brand's punishment: a reduction in rank. While some have labeled Brand's offense torture, he disagrees.
60 Minutes - Wounds of War	16 minutes	2006	DVD; Due to improvements in body armor and battlefield medicine, American soldiers wounded in the Iraq War are surviving their injuries, coming home, and beginning to rebuild their lives. They have lost limbs, suffered brain injury, and they tell their stories to Mike Wallace.
'62 Storm-Delaware's Shared Response, The	55 minutes	2008	residents living along the Atlantic coast in March, 1962 will never forget the great "Ash Wednesday" storm. This powerful winter nor'easter pounded Delaware's shoreline for 3 days and 5 successive high tides, destroying homes and businesses, flooding communities, and taking lives. Using archival photos, home movies, and interviews of those who survived, this program re-lives Delaware's greatest 20th Century disaster and the weather events that spawned it, and reflects on the possibility of a similar storm occurring along Delaware's coast today.
Abe Lincoln In Illinois	110 min.	1939	Moving, dignified film version of Robert Sherwood's Pulitzer Prize-winning play with Raymond Massey as the very human backwoods lawyer.
Abraham Lincoln	90 min.	1930	Directed by D.W. Griffith, Walter Huston portrays Lincoln as a man, a figure of flesh and blood, not of bronze and marble.
Absent-Minded Professor, The	96 min.	1961	Fred MacMurray, a bumbling college science teacher, discovers the anti-gravity substance---flubber.
Africa Speaks to the World	28 min.	1986	At the U.N., a new spotlight has turned on Africans themselves. Acknowledging their mistakes, yet affirming their strengths, they now ask the world's governments and churches to work with them in a new spirit to develop further the many nations on the continent, African leaders from government and church engage in this new dialogue, and discuss the progress being made, with video input from Tanzania and Zimbabwe.
Africa. Part 1. Different But Equal	57 min.	1984	For over four centuries Africa was ravished by the slave trade. This has permanently distorted our view of the continent and its people. Basil Davidson goes back to Africa's origins to show that, far from having no great art or technology, Africa gave rise to some of the world's greatest early civilizations.

Mastering A Continent.	57 min.	1984	Looking closely at three different communities, Basil Davidson examines the way African peoples carve out an existence in an often hostile environment. A group of Pokot cattle herders in Kenya tell how they use the natural environment to their advantage, Two very different farming villages show how, in Africa, spiritual development goes hand in hand with technological advance.
Africa. Part 3. Caravans of Gold.	57 min.	1984	Basil Davidson traces the routes of the medieval gold trade, which reached from Africa to India and China in the east, and westward to the city states of Italy. African rulers grew rich and powerful - the King of Ghana was described by an Arab traveler in AD 951 as the wealthiest of all kings on earth. It was the coming of the Portuguese in 1498 which heralded the end of the great African trade.
Africa. Part 4. Kings and Cities.	57 min,	1984	To explore the ways in which the African kingdoms functioned, Davidson visited Kano in Nigeria, where a king still holds court in his 15th C. palace, presiding with his council over ancient rituals which continue to command the respect of the people.
Africa. Part 5. The Bible and the Gun.	57 min.	1984	The slave trade in Africa decimated the population and rent apart the fabric of society, After the slave traders came new kinds of interlopers: first, the explorers, among them Stanley and Livingstone; and then the missionaries. Next came those interested not in souls but in wealth - gold and diamonds- men like Cecil Rhodes, who envisioned an empire stretching from " Cape to Cairo."
Africa. Part 6. This Magnificent African Cake.	57 min.	1984	The 1880's saw the beginning of a 30-year "scramble for Africa," which dramatically changed the face of the continent. All of Africa, except for Liberia and Ethiopia, became subject to colonial rule, a condition unchanged until the outbreak of the second World War.
Africa. Part 7. The Rite of Nationalism	57 min.	1984	Here the major struggles for African independence- in Ghana, Kenya, Algeria, the Belgian Congo- are all charted. Basil Davidson looks closely at the situation in Guinea Bissau and talks to the military leader in Mozambique. He also focuses on the final collapse of the white minority in Zimbabwe and then turns to South Africa to question how long this final bastion of white rule can survive.

Africa. Part 8. The Legacy.	57 min.	1984	Basil Davidson looks at Africa in the after-math of colonial rule, as the continent seeks ways to come to terms with its diverse inheritance. Interviews with statesmen, including Mugabe in Zimbabwe, Shagari in Nigeria, and Senghor in Senegal, illuminate the problems and successes of Africa today.
African Famine: Media and Message	28 min.	1987	Examines attitudes of Western media toward Third World problems and looks at our reaction to the coverage of Ethiopia's famine.
African Wildlife	60 min.	1980	Witness the realities of birth, death, and survival in this vivid encounter with the animal world. African Wildlife was filmed in Namibia's Etosha National Park over the course of two years, capturing extraordinary close-ups of animal behavior : a wild beast giving birth, a zebra mother successfully defending her foal from the swift attack of a cheetah, & a young spring buck alerting his herd to the presence of a predator with stiff- legged leaps.
Africans: Part 1	60 min.	1986	Part 1: The nature of a continent. Archaeological finds point to Africa as the birth place of humankind. Discover geography's impact in Africa, including the Nile's role in the origin of civilization.
Africans: Part 2	60 min.	1986	Part 2: A legacy of Lifestyles. Contemporary African lifestyles are influenced by indigenous, Islamic, and Western factors. This program compares simple and complex African lifestyles and looks at family life.
Africans: Part 3	60 min.	1986	Part 3: New Gods. How do traditional African religions, Islam, and Christianity coexist and influence one another?
Africans: Part 4	60 min.	1986	Part 4: Tools of Exploitation. The West had a great impact on Africa, and vice versa. This program looks at how Africa's human and natural resources have been exploited before, during, and after the colonial period.

Africans: Part 9	60 min.	1986	Part 9: Global Africa. This program looks at African contributions to contemporary world culture. It also examines the continuing influence of the superpowers on the affairs of the continent.
Aguirre-Wrath of God	94 min.	1972	Klaus Kinski stars as the mad "Aguirre" who sets out on a journey with a small band of Pizarro's conquistadores down the Amazon in search of the land of El Dorado- the mythical City of Gold. The only remaining evidence of the band is the journal kept by the priest who accompanied the band, on which this account is based.
Akira	124 minutes	1988	DVD; Kaneda is a bike gang leader whose close friend Tetsuo gets involved in a government secret project known as Akira. On his way to save Tetsuo, Kaneda runs into a group of anti-government activists, greedy politicians, irresponsible scientists and a powerful military leader. The confrontation sparks off Tetsuo's supernatural power leading to bloody death, a coup attempt and the final battle in Tokyo Olympiad where Akira's secrets were buried 30 years ago.
Alexander Nevsky	107 min.	1938	Eisenstein's epic tale of Cherkassov and Russian army repelling German invasion during the 13th century, a disturbing parallel to world situation at time of production. Magnificently visualized battle sequences, wonderful score.
All About Eve	138 min.	1950	A film of theatrical ambition and deception. Bette Davis plays a powerful actress at the apex of her career who does battle with a calculating newcomer (Anne Baxter).
All Quiet on the Western Front	2 hrs. 16 min.	1930	Lewis Milestone's screen adaptation of Erich Remarque's anti-war novel has lost little of its original impact. The plot follows a group of young German recruits in WWI through their passage from idealism to disillusionment. The film has many now-famous scenes-Ayres trapped in a crater with the man he has killed, the first meeting of recruits & veterans, Ayres' pacifist speech to his astonished schoolmate, and the final shot of the soldier's hand reaching for the fatal butterfly.
All The Presidents Men	135 min.	1976	Presents in dramatized form the two critical years of the Watergate Scandal and its background as recounted in the Pulitzer Prize winning book of the same name. Stars Robert Redford and Dustin Hoffman.

Alligator on the Zipper	60 minutes	2007	DVD; Women truck drivers aren't usually thought of as American folk heroes, yet the seven women portrayed in this documentary evoke the qualities of modern day cowboys. Courageous, adventurous and with a fierce love for freedom, they heed the call of the road that speaks to their independent spirit.
America and the Holocaust: Deceit and Indifference	60 min.	1993	Using interviews, archival photos and documents, and home movies and film from the time, this program traces the tragic story of America's failure to respond to the Nazi's policy toward the Jews on two levels: through the experience of Kurt Klein, a Jewish refugee trying to save his parents and through documented evidence of the US gov't.'s official policy.
America: The Story of Us. Disc 1	3 hours	2010	Focuses on the people, ideas and events that built America covering 400 years of american history. Disc 1: Rebels, Revolution, Westward, Division and bonus showing American Revolution, Declaration of Independence, and George Washington.
America: The Story of Us. Disc 2	3 hours	2010	Focuses on the people, ideas and events that built America covering 400 years of american history. Disc 2: Civil War, Heartland, Cities, Boom, and bonus Transcontinental Railroad, Statue of Liberty, Henry Ford and the Model T

Moderately political in nature, the narrators talk about the impact different kinds and methods of photography. The major breakthroughs and ground breaking decisions made to use photos instead of words and with words to tell the story of humanity.
American President, The	600 minutes	2005	DVD; The American President is the first documentary series ever to profile all 41 of America's chief executives. The 10-hour series tells the nation's story from the perspective of the highest office in the land and features exclusive interviews with President Clinton and all the living former presidents. (5 DVD's)

American Radical: The Trials of Norman Finkelstein	89 minutes	2009	A documentary about Norman Finkelstein that confronts questions of identity, nationhood, social justice and freedom. Finkelstein is a devoted son of holocaust survivors, ardent critic of US and Israeli Mid-East policy and author of five books. From Beirut to Kyoto, the film follows Finkelstein around the world as he attempts to negotiate a voice among supporters and critics.

An Oral Historian's Work- with Dr. Edward Ives	33min	1987	Edward D. Ives, Professor of Folklore at the University of Maine, explains and demonstrates the successful completion of an oral history project. A series of tape-recorded interviews with woodsmen and riverdrivers who worked in the Maine woods in the 1920s. A booklet, A general Interview guide, accompanies the videotape.
Anatomy of a Coup: The CIA in Iran	50 minutes		DVD; In 1953, the CIA helped overthrow the elected prime minister of Iran and re-install the Shah to power. CIA agents, family members, and historians help detail how the Agency was able to plot its first successful coup, and analyze its disturbing legacy.
Ancient Games	28 min	1972	This film re-creates the historic Pythian games which were second in importance only to the Olympic Games. Reenacted at Delphi, site of the original games. Former Olympic decathlon gold medallists Bill Toomey and Rafer Johnson compete in the five events of the pentathlon.
Ancient Maya: Tools of Astronomy	50 minutes	2006	DVD; Host Michael Guillen travels to Mexico's Yucatan peninsula to get a firsthand look at the ancient world's most skilled astronomers. Climb the giant pyramid of Kukulkan and see how it functioned as a giant solar observatory. Examine "El Caracol" at Tikal, which looks amazingly like a modern day observatory. Learn how the Maya used the sun to lay out their various temples and observatories and examine their incredibly complex and accurate calendar.
And This Is Free: The Life and Times of Chicago's Legendary Maxwell Street	100 minutes	1965	DVD; Through two films, this collection explores the vibrant history of Chicago's legendary Maxwell Street, an area that blossomed from a simple wooden-plank road into the birthplace of Chicago blues. The 1964 documentary And This Is Free offers a slice-of-life portrait of the local scene at the time. Maxwell Street: A Living Memory looks back on the experiences and legacy of the neighborhood's Eastern European Jewish immigrants.

Andalusian Dog and Different from the Others	16min	1928	Silent Screen Movie Classics. One from Germany and one from France. Different from the others: A prosperous man encounters a sleazy blackmailer who discovers that he is gay. For its day, this film is an amazingly frank depiction of a homosexual relationship. Andalusian dog: A surrealistic film classic presenting hallucinatory scenes of desire and anguish.
Andrew Carnegie: The Gospel of Wealth	26 min.	1985	This film reenacts Carnegie's selling of the Carnegie Steel Works to J.P. Morgan for 300 million dollars. Carnegie's essay, "The Gospel of Wealth" explains his reasons for wanting to sell his business and using it for philanthropic purposes. This film deals with these issues.
Andy Hardy Meets Debutante	89 min.	1940	Young Andy (Mickey Rooney) is dazzled by the picture of a debutante in a society magazine. When Judge Hardy's crusade to save an orphanage takes him to New York City, Andy tags along in hopes of meeting her. But New York shows little sympathy for a cocky, small town boy. Each one of his schemes to break into high society back-firs with humorous results. Finally, his old pal, Betsy Booth (Garland), a society girl herself lends him a hand. Garland & Rodney confirm why they were adored by millions of movie-goers in this entertaining film.

Animal Farm	75 min.	1955	A parallel of the growth of totalitarian dictatorships as satirized by George Orwell, and filmed as an animated feature.
Apartheid-Part V	58 min.	1987	For 8 days in July 1987 an unprecedented confrontation occurred in Senegal-dissident Afrikaners met with outlawed black leader of the African National Congress to discuss change, in spite of the risks involved for both sides. They talked about racial violence & the armed struggle, the role of communists in the ANC & future economic & political structures for a new South Africa under majority black rule.
Apocalypse Now	153 min.	1979	Francis Ford Coppola's vision of man's heart of darkness revealed through the madness of the Vietnam War. Lt. Willard (Martin Sheen) receives orders to seek out a renegade military outpost led by the mysterious Col. Kurt (Marlon Brando) and terminate him.
Arab And Jew: Wounded Spirits In A Promised Land	120 min.	1989	An intimate look at Israeli and Palestinian society and the complicated relationships in the former Arab territories now under the jurisdiction of the state of Israel. The program examines the origins of the division, between these people beginning with Israel's 1948 war for independence.

Arming Dictators	28 min.	1993	A disturbing picture of US support for authoritarian governments in El Salvador, Indonesia, Saudi Arabia, and Zaire. Despite the collapse of the Soviet Union, undemocratic regimes still get the best weapons and training that the US has to offer.
Army-Navy Screen Magazine Highlights—Vol. 1	52 min.		Includes selections from the Army-Navy Screen Magazine shown to U.S. troops during World War II. Highlights include: "Hollywood Canteen" (April 1944); "The Story of cpl. Jolley" (July 1944); "By Request" (Jan. 1945); "Jubilee" (June 1944); "Spies" (July 1943); "V-1!" Art of the Dogon	24 min.	1988	The Dogon people of Mali possess one of the richest art traditions in West Africa. Residing in an imposing landscape of steep cliffs and arid plains, the Dogon have for centuries created powerful sculptures to use in various rituals and in their daily life. This film is based in Lester Wunderman's collection at the Met Museum & his archival footage shot in Mali. This film attempts to capture the beauty & power of Dogon art while placing it in context within Dogon beliefs and culture.
Art of the Western World-Preview	color	1987	An introduction to and study of artistic masterpieces from the Western world. Interpretation and commentary by art historians emphasize the significance of each work and its relationship to art movements, art theory and the social environment.
Atocha: Quest for Treasure	60min	1986	Discover a fortune in sunken treasure with Atocha: Quest for Treasure. In 1622, the Spanish galleon Nuestra Senora de Atocha sank off the coast of Florida. In her hold, she carried 40 tons of gold and silver and some 70 pounds of emerald contraband. For more than 300 years, men have died trying to find her and her priceless cargo. Join modern day treasure-hunter Mel Fisher who, after a 16 year search, found the riches that so many have sought.
Atomic Café, The		1982	This collage film focuses on the 40's and 50's, showing clips of soldiers wearing sunglasses going into areas devastated by nuclear detonation and suburban families practicing using their bomb shelters. An entertaining look at how we got where we are.

Au Revoir Les Enfants (Goodbye, Children)	103 minutes	1987	Set in a Catholic boarding school during the German occupation of France, this is the story of Julien Quentin, a 12 yr. Old boy who befriends the new student in his class. Jean Bonnet seems different from others, but the two begin a friendship. Then, Julien makes a frightening discovery about his friend—the secret surrounding his identity. A secret which will soon be revealed to the Gestapo and change their lives forever.
Ayatollah: Holy Terror	50 min.	1997	An episode of the A&E Television program "Biography" describing the life of the Ayatollah Ruhallah Khomeini.
Bad Day At Black Rock	78 min.	1954	Strangers aren't welcome in Back Rock, as Spencer Tracey (Macreeedy) discovers when he arrives. The people of Black Rock hide a deadly secret that's ready to explode—and Macreeedy is the spark. A provocative exploration of the darker side of human nature. Also stars Lee Marvin, Ernest Borgnine, and Walter Brennan.
Ballad of Cable Hogue	122 min.	1969	Directed by Sam Peckinpah. Starring Jason Robards as Hogue, an old frontiersman who made his fortune selling water to thirsty desert travelers—and who waits for the day when the two men who left him to die in the Arizona desert stop by for a drink. Also stars Stella Stevens and David Warner.
Ballad of Gregorio Cortez, The	105 minutes	1983	VHS; It is 1901, and two Texas cultures the Anglo and the Mexican live side by side in a state of tension and fear. On June 12 Gregorio Cortez, a young Mexican family man, shoots and kills a sheriff in self-defense. For the next 11 days, he eludes an inflamed posse of 600 Texas Rangers in a 450 mile chase across Texas. His manhunt captures the nation's interest, and his eventual trial is tainted by extreme emotions of the country. To some Cortez becomes an instant folk-hero; to most others is considered a dangerous criminal. It takes 12 years to learn the truth.
Ballad of Little Jo	124 min.	1993	After bearing an illegitimate child, society girl Josephine Monaghan leaves home in disgrace. On the road west, she discovers that a woman alone is sexual prey for any man—so she disguises herself as a boy. As Little Jo, she confronts all the dangers the west has to offer—from deadly winters to murderous outlaws.
Ballad of Narayama	129 min.	1983	Imagine a village so impoverished that thieves are buried alive and elderly citizens must submit to death on a cold mountain peak. This is the brutal life portrayed in Imamura's shocking yet moving masterpiece.
