a. Rationale for creation, revision, or deletion:

The University of Delaware recently added a new M.Ed. major in Reading. The program was developed in accordance with the International Reading Association Standards for Literacy Professionals and the Conceptual Framework of the School of Education of the University of Delaware. It focuses on classroom teaching, intervention with students who struggle with reading, and the management and assessment of reading programs. It is consistent with new federal mandates to certify “highly qualified” professionals and consistent with the State of Delaware’s certification program for Reading Specialists. It is a 33-36 hour program, with 3 supervised practica in assessment and instruction of students with difficulties with literacy.

Current faculty have supported the first cohort of student through the sequence of courses that together form the foundation in reading assessment and reading instruction. Because the program is designed for part-time work, courses are taught in the evening. Consequently, faculty arranged for children of various ages to come to the university in the early evening, and candidates for this degree spend part of their class time in lecture and part in tutoring under the supervision of their professors.

Candidates at the mid point of the program complete a portfolio to document their progress toward program goals. Review of student progress indicates that the current program design provides insufficient opportunity for candidates to link research and practice. In addition, locating and managing child participants was difficult both for candidates and for faculty members. Consequently, the faculty propose to modify the program, providing a more extensive supervised practicum experience during the summer. This will allow additional time for development of candidate knowledge during the first two courses in the sequence, and additional opportunities for supervised application during the combined new lecture/practicum course. In addition, management of a small summer small reading clinic might allow increased collaboration between the Literacy faculty and the College School and could benefit both University of Delaware candidates and local struggling readers.

The table below summarizes the proposed changes. In essence, we propose to restructure the content of EDUC 608 and EDUC 609 and replace EDUC 668 and EDUC 630 with a new combined 6-hour summer class. Italicized descriptions are modifications of the course description designed to drive syllabus revisions to address weaknesses indicated in candidates’ progress toward IRA standards. If the program changes are approved, the faculty will begin the formal revision of the course descriptions.

EDUC 608 Teaching Reading in the Elementary and Middle Grades (3)	<i>Students explore the relationships between reading theory, research, and practice. Particular emphasis is placed on understanding the psychological, sociological, and linguistic foundations of reading and writing processes and instruction. Seminal reading research studies will be examined.</i>
EDUC 609 Assessment & Instruction for Reading: Primary Grades (3)	<i>This course focuses on assessment and instruction of reading and writing for K-12 students with learning problems. Particular emphasis on the importance of matching assessment to instruction to support school-age children's literacy development. Participants develop expertise in the use of formal and informal assessments that measure a variety of literacy skills including emerging concepts of print, alphabet knowledge, word recognition, decoding, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and writing. Prereq: EDUC 608 or permission of instructor.</i>
EDUC 668 Assessment & Instruction for Reading: Intermediate Grades (3)	DELETE THIS COURSE FROM REQUIREMENTS
EDUC 630 Assessment & Instruction for Reading: Middle and High School Grades (3)	DELETE THIS COURSE FROM REQUIREMENTS
	<i>EDUC 630: Supervised Reading Clinic (6) Supervised practice and seminar in assessing and instructing students who struggle with reading and writing. Experiences are designed to prepare students to manage and instruct individual children/adolescents and groups of children/adolescents. Participants will have opportunities to implement and discuss a wide range of instructional approaches, methods, and materials as they work closely with school-age students. Prereq: EDUC 608 and EDUC 609 or permission of instructor.</i>

<p>EDUC 631 Organization and Supervision of Literacy Programs (3) <i>This course may be taken at any time in the program, but must be taken after EDUC 608, and it is recommended that it be taken after the full four-course sequence listed above. This is a new course developed to meet certification requirements.</i></p>	No change
<p>EDUC 617 Delaware Reading Project (3 or 6) OR EDUC 649 Delaware Writing Project (6) <i>This “capstone course” must be taken as the last course in the program.</i></p>	No change
