G O A L S

Goal 1: High Quality Professional Preparation

Provide exemplary professional preparation and development programs for the public school educators. These programs demonstrate rigor, innovation, and attention to the needs, and build on the strengths, of diverse children and youth. Their design, content, and delivery must reflect research and best practice.

Goal 2: Simultaneous Renewal

Engage in the simultaneous renewal of public K-12 schools and the education of beginning and experienced educators by establishing strong partnerships of universities, schools, and professional organizations and associations.

Goal 3: Equity, Diversity, and Cultural Competence

Actively work on equity, diversity, and cultural competence in the programs of K-12 schools, higher education, and the education profession by recruiting, preparing, and sustaining faculty and students who reflect and deeply understand the implications of the rich diversity of cultural perspectives in this country and our global community.

Goal 4: Scholarly Inquiry and Programs of Research

Conduct and disseminate educational research and engage in other scholarly activities that advance knowledge, improve teaching and learning for all children and youth, inform the preparation and development of educators, and influence educational policy and practice.

Goal 5: Faculty Development

Provide high quality doctoral programs for the future education professorate and for advanced professional development of school-based educators. Redesign the work of both university and school faculty to enable accomplishment of The Holmes Partnership goals — better preparing educators in improving learning for children and youth. Promote conditions that recognize and reward education professionals who better serve the needs of all learners.

Goal 6: Policy Initiation

Engage in policy analysis and development related to public K-12 schools and the preparation of educators. Advocate policies that improve teaching and learning for all students, promote school improvement and enhance the preparation and continuing professional development of all educators.

The first Holmes Partnership Conference of the 21st Century will be hosted by the University of Cincinnati and will be held January 28 to January 30, 2000. This year we will share our collective knowledge about powerful partnerships which will provide quality education for all children and youth in the 21st century.

How does the partnership help you address some of the issues facing education, such as the privatization of education (vouchers, charter schools), high stakes testing, and state and national education reform efforts? How can partnerships help gather the needed data to inform policy and practice? How do partnerships impact diversity? How do we form more powerful partnerships to improve teacher education and make a difference in effective learning for all children and youth?

Join us in the Greater Cincinnati metropolitan area where Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana are joined. Situated in the valleys and hills along the historic Ohio River, Cincinnati is the perfect combination of "big city" and "small town." You will find something for everybody in Cincinnati: performing arts, museums, professional sports, a top-rated zoo, a new aquarium, historic sites, casinos, and much more. Our meeting site, the Dr. Albert B. Sabin Cincinnati Convention Center, is conveniently linked to our conference hotel, the Regal Cincinnati, by an enclosed, climate-controlled skywalk system convenient for dining, shopping, and entertainment.

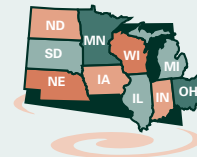

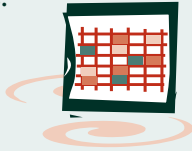
Innovative practices will be shared through visual displays and informal discussions which highlight the advancement of the six Holmes Partnership goals.

- How specific role contributions make a partnership successful



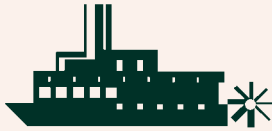

Historic Town and Inn

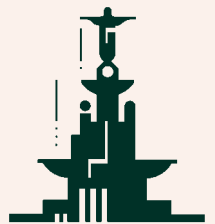


Visit quaint Lebanon, Ohio, with its brick sidewalks and more than 40 antique and specialty shops

The Conference Hotel

The Regal Cincinnati Hotel is located in the heart of Cincinnati with convenient access to shopping, museums, dining, and entertainment. The hotel is at the front door of the Dr. Albert B. Sabin Cincinnati Convention Center, directly connected by one of the city's many enclosed skywalks. The Regal Cincinnati features two restaurants, including *Seafood 32*, a revolving rooftop restaurant on the 32nd floor that specializes in seafood and steaks and offers a spectacular view of the city; two lounges; fitness facilities with sauna, racquetball and squash courts; an outdoor pool; barber shop; gift shop; and indoor valet parking.

Getting Around

Jetport Xpress is available at the airport for transportation to and from the Regal Cincinnati Hotel. The cost is \$12 for a one-way ticket and \$16 for a round-trip ticket. Tickets can be purchased at the Jetport Xpress desk in any of the three terminals.
