QUALIFICATIONS: Earned doctorate in Counselor Education from CACREP accredited program preferred, or a doctorate in a closely-related area. Active, ongoing program of research in higher education settings. A record of published scholarship, university teaching and grant support is preferred. Expertise and accomplishments in any of the following areas are desired: counseling and student development theory/practice in higher education, supervising practicum/internship training and teaching individual/group counseling theory and skills, assessment and career counseling theory, and multicultural issues in counseling. The ability to work in an interdisciplinary environment is required.

RESPONSIBILITIES: Teach graduate courses in the M.A. program in Counseling in Higher Education as well as undergraduate courses in human development, family studies and/or human services; advise graduate students; develop and maintain an active program of research; seek and obtain extramural grant funding; engage in service activities consistent with and supportive of teaching and scholarship.

PROGRAM: The Department of Human Development and Family Studies offers B.S., M.A., M.S., and Ph.D. degrees. The M.A. in Counseling in Higher Education degree program typically enrolls about 25 full-time graduate students and takes two academic years to complete. Admission to the program is highly competitive. One of the strategic planning priorities for the department is to seek accreditation from CACREP within the next two years. The Department also has an accredited Human Services program and has strong collaborative relations with the Center for Disabilities Studies, the Center for Community Research and Service, and the Center for Counseling and Student Development.

COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY: The University of Delaware is a Land Grant, Sea Grant and Space Grant institution with a full time faculty of over 1,100 and an enrollment of approximately 16,000 undergraduates and 3,500 graduate students. The College of Human Services, Education, and Public Policy (CHEP) is the second largest college of the University. CHEP is an interdisciplinary, professional, service-oriented college. The University is located in Newark, a city of 25,000 in Northwestern Delaware. In the heart of the mid-Atlantic metropolitan region, the University is within easy reach of colleagues and research sites in Washington, D.C., New York City, Philadelphia, and Baltimore.
