

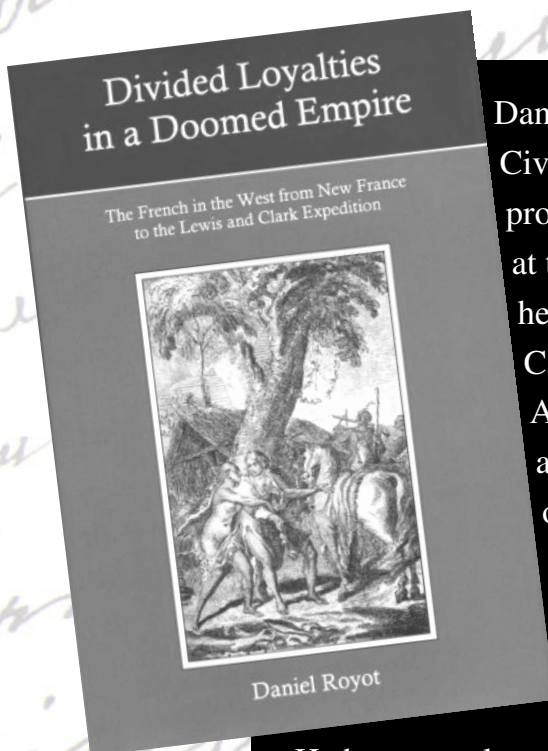

### **“Bald Eagle and Rooster: The French Paradoxes of Americanization and Anti-Americanism from Past to Present”**



Daniel Royot, Emeritus Professor of American Literature and Civilization at the Sorbonne, Paris, has often taught as a visiting professor in the United States. He was in the English Department at the University of Delaware in 1991 and 1996. For his fieldwork, he was awarded grants by the Fulbright Committee and the Canadian Research Council. He has written extensively on American literature, ethnicity, cultural studies, motion pictures, and humor. He has published about thirty-five books in his field of studies. His publications in the United States include articles or chapters in English on William Byrd II, Benjamin Franklin, Edgar Allan Poe, James Russell Lowell, Benjamin Shillaber, and Thomas Berger.

He has recently written extensively on French anti-Americanism especially in a special issue of *Cités* devoted to "La France et ses Demons."

His book *Divided Loyalties in a Doomed Empire: The French in the West from New France to the Lewis and Clark Expedition*, University of Delaware Press, was singled out as Outstanding Academic Title for 2007 by CHOICE magazine.
