Career Brief

Christy A. Visher is Professor, Department of Sociology and Criminal Justice at the University of Delaware and Director of the Center for Drug and Alcohol Studies, a research center within the department. Dr. Visher has over 25 years of experience in policy research on crime and justice issues. Her research interests focus on criminal careers, criminal justice evaluation, communities and crime, violence, and substance abuse. She has published widely on crime and justice topics, including prisoner reentry, crime prevention strategies, the arrest process, youthful offending, incapacitation, and use of drug testing in the criminal justice system.

Previously, Dr. Visher was science advisor to the Director, deputy director of research, and research associate at the National Institute of Justice, the research agency of the U.S. Department of Justice. She began her professional career at the National Research Council, Committee on Law and Justice, as a postdoctoral fellow and later, research associate, with the Panel on Criminal Careers. Her research has appeared in a variety of scholarly journals including Criminology, Journal of Research in Crime and Delinquency, Law & Society Review, Journal of Quantitative Criminology, American Sociological Review, Social Problems, and Justice Quarterly.

Professional Experience

June 2008 - Present Professor, University of Delaware, Department of Sociology and Criminal Justice and Director, Center for Drug and Alcohol Studies

Director. Directs a university-based research center that conducts collaborative research on substance abuse with social and behavioral science faculty, professional staff, and graduate students. The Center provides a national research focus as well as service to the State of Delaware. Administratively housed in the university's Department of Sociology and

Criminal Justice, the Center is funded entirely through sponsored research grants and contracts. The principal mission of the Center is the production, dissemination, and utilization of scientific knowledge about substance abuse and other health risk behaviors among hard-to-reach populations of youth and adults

Principal Investigator, *Criminal Justice Drug and Alcohol Treatment Studies Center*. This project is a national collaborative research project of nine Research Centers funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse. The principal focus is to develop a better understanding of the organizational and systems issues that can facilitate or undermine implementation of effective drug treatment and other services. The collaborative is studying how agencies, sites or programs adopt and implement evidence-based practices across different stages of criminal justice processing, and how the implementation of evidence-based programs and practices can be improved to yield better client outcomes and increased utilization of services.

2000-2008 Principal Research Associate, The Urban Institute

Co-Principal Investigator, *Multi-Site Evaluation of the Serious and Violent Offender Reentry Initiative*. The study evaluated a \$100 million federal initiative designed to fund innovative efforts to improve state and local prisoner reentry outcomes along criminal justice, employment, education, health, and housing dimensions. The 6-year evaluation included an implementation assessment, impact evaluation, and cost-benefit analysis. Sponsor: National Institute of Justice.

Principal Investigator, *Returning Home: Understanding the Challenges of Prisoner Reentry*. Developed and directed a multi-site, longitudinal study to examine prisoner reentry and reintegration from multiple dimensions – the individual trajectories of post-prison adjustment, the community and family context to which former prisoners return, and state reentry processes and other social and economic influences within Maryland, Illinois, Ohio, and Texas.
