None. As detailed in the Program Policy Statement, Deans Okagaki, Watson, and Matt were all involved in a preliminary discussion leading to the development of this proposal.

Describe the rationale for the proposed program change(s):

There is currently no program in Speech-Language Pathology (SLP) in the state of Delaware at the master's level, which is the entry level degree required for practice in this field. Yet, as is the case for many areas of specialization in the health care workforce, there is an acute need for qualified practitioners in this field within the state. As described in detail in the program policy statement, the state governor's office appointed a 2008 task force and a 2011 follow-up working group to study this issue and make recommendations. The ultimate recommendation was that such a program should be developed at the University of Delaware in the College of Health Sciences.

Professor Beth Mineo is currently the only faculty member at the University of Delaware with expertise in SLP. It is clear that in order to launch the master's program, we will need a minimum of five additional faculty lines. The governor's office has indicated willingness to entertain a proposal for allocation of the necessary resources to start the program, but only after there is commitment by the University to launch an approved curriculum. Specifically, the governor's office wishes to have confirmation that a curriculum for this program has been approved by the university prior to any commitment of resources.

To assist with the development of plans for the program, in addition to tapping the expertise of Professor Mineo, we brought in three external consultants who are all well-experienced directors of existing master's programs in SLP. The proposal presented here and in the program policy statement reflects their extensive understanding of programmatic needs and requirements in SLP.

Program Requirements:

Because the College of Health Sciences does not currently have a Department of Speech-Language Pathology, we are presenting the curriculum for approval through our interdisciplinary major area—Health Studies. The course prefixes are therefore HLTH.

Degree Requirements for the Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology

Program Prerequisites

A bachelor's degree is required for admission. The applicant must have completed coursework in statistics, physical science, biology, and social science in addition to the following prerequisite speech-language pathology and audiology courses or their equivalents. Prerequisite courses should be taken prior to matriculation, but if a student lacks two or fewer prerequisites, they can be completed on a non-graduate credit basis concurrently with graduate study. Prerequisite course requirements include:

- Phonetic Theory and Transcription
- Speech Acoustics/Acoustic Phonetics
- Fundamentals of Hearing or Introduction to Audiology
- Anatomy and Physiology of the Speech Mechanism
- Language Development
- Introduction to Communication Disorders

Program Requirements

The Master of Arts (M.A.) in Speech-Language Pathology requires a minimum of 45 credits of academic coursework, supplemented by 26 credits of additional coursework in internship and externship experiences. Students are required to successfully complete the required coursework with a GPA of 3.00 and to acquire 375 documented clinical practicum hours. Students must also achieve a passing score on the Praxis II: Speech-Language Pathology Test. The program is designed to be completed in 2 years, including required work during winter and summer sessions.
