Curriculum

As a World Scholar, you will spend the first semester of your freshman year in Rome, Italy, or Madrid, Spain, at one of our partner universities.

There, you will learn in small classes taught by professors who encourage dialogue and use the city as a learning laboratory.

Fall of your freshman year is just the beginning of a lifelong journey toward becoming an informed and engaged member of the global community. Upon returning to Delaware in the spring, you will continue a four-year integrated course of study with an international focus including sophomore-year residence in our International House; a second study abroad in your junior year with an internship, research, or service learning project; and a capstone and World Scholars symposium in your senior year. In addition to the requirements for your major, you will be required to minor in a globally-focused field of study.

Eligibility

The World Scholars program is by invitation only. Students admitted to the University in select majors with strong academic profiles are invited to apply. The program is intended to supplement a student's selected major. Due to course requirements and sequencing, only certain disciplines are eligible to participate in the program. All students aspiring to become World Scholars are required to have a valid passport, in hand, no later than April 1.

Fall Abroad

As a UD World Scholar, you will begin your college career abroad in a major European city. You may choose to study in Rome, Italy, at John Cabot University, or Madrid, Spain, at Saint Louis University. Both UD World Scholar sites have been selected for their academic rigor and coursework taught in English, American style amenities, residential living opportunities, and the quality of advising and support services that will ensure a successful start to your college career.

To support your success while abroad, you will have a team of experts, including academic advisors, career counselors, health and wellness professionals and Student Life staff, ready to assist you.

During your first semester, you will enroll in 15-17 academic credits, and will be enrolled in an Introduction to World Politics course. You may choose from a variety of courses, spanning humanities, business, social sciences and the arts, that meet UD graduation requirements.

Weekends and evenings offer time for activities like club sports, theatre, music and community service. Students also find our European sites to be perfect home bases for travel in country and across borders.



Spring in Delaware

Upon arriving on campus in spring of freshman year, you will enroll in an exclusive First Year Seminar with freshmen from across the globe.
You will also join Delaware Diplomats in exploring international opportunities on campus, such as a film series, lectures, language partner exchanges and coffee hours. Throughout the spring, you will learn about globally-focused minors at UD and will be advised on your selection.



SOPHOMORE YEAR

In your sophomore year, you will reside alongside international students in International House, a living and learning community focused on intercultural understanding and building global competencies. Faculty fellows, upper-class mentors and career counselors will provide programs and resources focused on careers in foreign service, the Peace Corps, diplomacy, international business and more.

You may major in any of the eligible courses of study but must enroll in an internationally focused academic minor. Options include, but are not limited to:

By participating in an internship, research or service learning experience along with your coursework, you will emerge a more confident and competent global citizen.


