

This holiday 4-H activity is designed for everyone who participates to have fun and bring happiness to others during the holiday season. As a club, 4-H members use their creative energy to construct handmade decorations for a Christmas Tree. The trees should be placed around the community and remain there during the holiday season. When selecting your location, it is important to choose a location that is open during our office hours (8:30 am-4:30 pm). Trees are judged for neatness and originality and the primary objective is to share some holiday joy with

those who need it most. This is only a club contest, but individuals are encouraged to display their own tree around the community as a service project. Trees should be in place by December 2nd. They will be judged sometime during the following 2 weeks. Clubs should complete the entry form attached and return it to the 4-H office by November 19th for your tree to be included in the judging.

- 1. All decorations must be handmade, but can include any type of material. This can include decorations made from natural material, cloth, ceramics, etc. Decorations cannot be food items, which spoil easily.
- 2. Tree designs **MUST HAVE** a **TITLE** visible to judges indicating the tree's theme.
- 3. Energy efficient electric lights may be used, but they are not necessary.
- 4. All Clubs will provide their own trees. Tree height must be over 3 feet.
- 5. Clubs should be sure to **identify their 4-H Club name** at the tree display—be proud to promote your 4-H club work!

• Youth Participants must be a member of a 4-H Club, 4-H Archery Club, 4-H Shooting Sports Club or a County 4-H Shooting Sports Program where during the club year they have received archery instruction from a certified Delaware 4-H Archery Instructor.





General Equipment Rules

JIVERSITY OF

- 1. Contestants will use their own archery equipment and arrows.
 - a. If a contestant needs equipment we can make arrangements for equipment to be available for use, but these arrangements must be made in advance.
- 2. All equipment will be inspected for safety, condition, etc. by field officials prior to the match and at any time during the match when inspection is merited.
- 3. If equipment is found to be unsafe and corrections are not made before the match, the contestant will NOT be able to compete and will forfeit their registration fee.
- 4. Maximum bow weight allowed in any division is 60 pounds. This will be checked before the match. Bows above the maximum draw weight must be modified and re-checked.
- 5. A nocking point indicator is required to position the nock of an arrow on the string. The nocking point indicator may be of any conventional design, including materials that may be crimped, wound or heat shrunk to the center serving.
- An arrow must be released off of a felt arrow shelf, whisker biscuit or other arrow rest.
 (Overdraws may not place the arrow rest further than 6cm from the pivot point of the bow.)
- 7. At full draw, arrows must extend beyond the back of the bow. Clickers will be allowed.
- 8. Arrows consist of a shaft with a target or practice point, nock, fletching and personal identification markings. Arrows must be sound and spined for the bow.
- 9. Each archer must provide an adequate number of arrows to complete the event.
- 10. Release aids may be used only by compound shooters. Competence with the equipment must have been demonstrated before the release aid may be used.
- 11. Each archer must wear and use arm guard and finger protection.
 - a. No glove or bare finger shooting is **NOT** permitted.
- 12. DRESS CODE: Normal 4-H dress code applies.
 - a. Closed toe shoes are **REQUIRED**.
 - i. Crocs are **NOT** closed toe shoes.
 - b. Long Pants are **HIGHLY** recommended.
 - c. Long hair must be pulled back, away from members face.
- 13. Each archer will be required to use a hip/clip-on arrow quiver **ONLY**.
 - a. Bow mounted or quivers worn on the back are **NOT** permitted.
- 14. ALL participants must attend a mandatory safety orientation meeting prior to match.
- 15. Minimum arrow weight is 5 grains per 1lb of draw weight.
- 16. Bow stands are not provided, but can be used.
- 17. Since the Field and 3D ranges are combined, range finders are **NOT** permitted on the Field/3D range at all.
 - a. Possession of one is grounds for disqualification.
 - b. Binoculars are allowed.
- 18. Spotting scopes may be used on the FITA range as long as they do not interfere with another archer. If they do interfere with another archer, youth will be asked to move the scope off the line by the Range Officer.

3D Information and Rules

Targets:

3D animal targets, examples: Deer, Strutting Turkey, Wild Boar, & Coyote.

Distances:


Junior 4-H'ers - known distances up to 20 Yards. Intermediate 4-H'ers - known distances up to 35 Yards. Senior 4-H'ers - unknown distances up to 50 Yards.

Time Limits:

Shooters will move through the course expeditiously and avoid delays. A maximum of 2 minutes will be allowed for searching for passed arrows.

Scoring:

IBO based Center Vital Zone Ring = 11 points Second Vital Zone Ring = 10 points Third Vital Zone Ring = 8 points Any other body shot = 5 points (Not Antlers/Horns) Clean miss = 0 points (includes witnessed glance offs)



An arrow embedded in the horn of an animal, not touching body color, is considered a miss and is scored as a zero. Targets with legs or hooves of a different color than the main body will still be considered as body color for scoring.

When shooting with your squad, all archers should be spotting for the archer shooting to assist with looking for arrows that miss, as well as to judge "*Glance Offs*" or "*Bounce Backs*".

Glance Offs are defined as a shot arrow that hits the target, but doesn't stick in the target and "Glances Off" continuing beyond the target. When this occurs and is witnessed, the score of the arrow is 0. The archer is NOT entitled to re-shoot the target in this case.

Bounce Backs are defined as a shot arrow that hits the target and "Bounces Back", not going into the target, and not traveling beyond the target. When this occurs and is witnessed by the squad, the archer is permitted to re-shoot the target with another arrow.

If a re-shoot is granted by the squad, the Archer must make the shot prior to any of the Archers within the squad approaching the target.

If their is a dispute within the group on whether if it is a "*Glance Off*" or a "*Bounce Back*", the target host on the course will contact a Range Officer and they will work with the squad and help resolve the issue(s).

Bows are to be left in bow stands or on the ground near the Target Host when going to Score and Retrieving Arrows from the Target.





Field Information and Rules

Targets:

National Field Archery Association (NFAA) targets of sizes selected by the management and appropriate to the course. All of the targets are set at marked distances. Instructions will be posted at each target and a Target Host is present at each target to answer basic questions.

Distances:

Junior 4-H'ers - known distances up to 20 Yards. Intermediate 4-H'ers - known distances up to 40 Yards. Senior 4-H'ers - known distances up to 60 Yards.

Time Limits:

Shooters will move through the course expeditiously and avoid delays. A maximum of 2 minutes will be allowed for searching for passed arrows.

Scoring:

5x, 5, 4, 3 points from center outwards

Scoring Rings

Two Center Black Rings	5 points	
Next Two White Rings	4 points	
Last Two (Outside) Black Rings	3 points

Some of the Field targets have "Walk-ups" or "Fans" and instructions are posted on each target. Each of the Field Targets have a "Target Host" to ensure safety and provide basic information. If you or the Squad you are shooting with have a more in depth question or issue, the host can Radio one of the Officials and they will be over to address them.

Bows are to be left in bow stands or on the ground near the Target Host when going to Score and Retrieving Arrows from the Target.

Objectives:

- 1. To provide youth with the opportunity to blend the knowledge and skills acquired in horse judging, horse bowl, demonstrations and public speaking, showing and practical horse experience into one activity.
- 2. To encourage youth to continue expanding their understanding, knowledge and participation in equine science.
- 3. To recognize youth for their total involvement in and comprehensive knowledge of the horse industry.
- 4. To teach good sportsmanship through a friendly and competitive environment.

Contestants and Eligibility:

- 1. Any Delaware 4-H members is eligible. Participants must be a currently enrolled member of a Delaware 4-H club and should have some familiarity with working around horses.
- 2. Age is calculated as of January 1, 2020
- Divisions: Cloverbuds- require adult supervision at the contest to participate. Beginner- Ages 8-10 Intermediate- Ages 11-13 Senior- Ages 14-19

Contest Rules and Regulations:

- 1. This is both an individual and team competition. Teams consist of 3 to 4 members. In teams in which there are four members, all will compete but only top three scores will count. The lowest team members' score will be dropped in any of the team totals, but will be utilized in making all individual awards. With a team of two (2) or less, members will be combined with another team when possible. Teams can be made up of different ages but the oldest member will determine the age division. Individual entries will be accepted.
- 2. Entries must be accompanied by appropriate entry fees. There will be an entry fee for each competitor. The entry fee is \$5 PER person
- 3. All contestants, coaches and volunteers are expected to dress and act like professionals at all times. Hard-toed shoes (no sneakers, clogs or sandals) must be worn during the competition.

Teams are encouraged to dress as a team but this is not required. The contest will be held in a barn setting so PLEASE dress warmly.

- 4. Parents, spectators and coaches will not be allowed in the competition area unless they are involved in an official position (please remember to dress for the weather).
- 5. While the contest is in progress, conferring between participants or between a participant and anyone else during Phase A of the contest is prohibited and may result in disqualification. Participants may speak to their station leader if they have any questions or problems.
- 6. <u>No cell phones are permitted to be used while the contest is underway.</u> The use of a cell phone may result in disqualification.
- 7. All contestants MUST bring their own clipboard, plain note paper and several sharpened pencils. LAWNCHAIRS recommended
- 8. Because this event is being hosted on a private farm, absolutely NO DOGS or PETS are permitted at the event.
- 9. Awards will be presented the day of the contest to the top 4 teams and to the top 4 individuals in each age division.
- 10. Reference material please refer to the Study Guide provided at the end of this document for this contest. All reference material is the same as used for the Horse Bowl.

Contest Format Scoring:

- 1. Individual Score is a combination of an individual's score from the Phase A Station Activities.
- 2. *Team Score* is calculated by tabulating the top 3 individual scores of team members from the Phase A Station Activities plus the total team score earned in Phase B.
- 3. Phase A Station Activities- completed as individuals:

Contestants should be prepared to ID horse body parts, bridle parts, tack, horse equipment, breeds of horses, coat color, color patterns, leg and face markings, feeds and feed ingredients, types of bits, farrier tools, parts of the hoof, etc. This phase is hands on.

Examples may include but are not limited to- put together a bridle, identify which bits are leverage types, grooming tools to be identified and put in the correct order of use, horse parts ID using a real horse, etc.

4. Phase B - Team Activity -2 stations- 10 minutes each-

This will test the skill of members to answer questions and complete problem solving team activities. Questions will be more advanced for older groups.

Example - Horse trailer and/or barn safety - members will need to recognize safe and unsafe items around and in the horse trailer and barn - What important items should be included on each trip?

Example - Use the tape measure to determine the horse's weight - give the horse a condition score and recommend a feeding program suitable for this animal. What are some ways to evaluate this horse's health and how to keep him healthy?

Example - What should you feed your horse? Evaluate and identify the hays - which ones will horses like to eat? Which ones are appropriate for which types or stages of growth of horses?

Example - english bridle vs western - point out the similar parts and different parts - Can older members recognized when bit is in backwards or if a part is missing? Western Saddles - What is wrong with this? Can you assemble? Proper cleaning of tack.

Example - Basic First Aid - what is in this box? Where do you take a horse's temperature? Check gums? listen to heart? Gut sounds?

Example- Evaluate and judge a class of horses- put together and present a set of oral reasons to an official to justify your placing utilizing the correct format, names of body parts and terms.

All calves, born June 1, 2019 to August 31, 2020 inclusive, of any dairy breed are eligible to enter the Delaware Youth Dairy Futurity. Calves **MUST** be exhibited by a Delaware State Fair Junior Dairy Exhibitor. Leased animals are eligible and an exhibitor must be named on the last entry on May 1, 2020.

1st payment of \$5.00 due on or before November 11, 2019 2nd payment of \$10.00 due on or before February 3, 2020 3rd payment of \$15.00 due on or before May 1, 2020 (last one)

Late Entries: If you do not enter the animal on the first due date, the entry fee will be doubled. If your first entry is made on February 1, you will pay \$30 on February 1. If you do not enter until May 1, your fee is \$70 on May 1.

Purses in this event shall consist of all moneys received by this association in connection therewith by any of nomination fees, grants, and donations from any person or persons or sponsors of this show.

The premium schedule for this class is as follows: 1st place: \$450; 2nd place \$350; 3rd place \$250, 4th place \$200, 5th place \$100, 6th-10th place \$75. The remaining entries will receive **no less** than \$50. Best Bred and Owned will receive \$100 in memory of Sam Dixon, Jr. Each exhibitor will receive a Futurity Shirt that must be worn during the show with white show pants. Sizes must be given on the May entry. The premium schedule is subject to change.
