## MEMBER VOICES

“Neither a borrower nor a lender be.” I had heard this well-known expression quoted many times, but I had never come across the phrase in its original context until the other day. From where did this wise advice come? The Bible? Ben Franklin? No. These words were penned by William Shakespeare in his play *Hamlet*. They are spoken by Polonius to his son Laertes in Act One, Scene 3, of a play I was supposed to read (but didn’t) in 11<sup>th</sup> grade English class *many* years ago. I am reading and enjoying *Hamlet* for the first time. This is one of the many benefits I am receiving from the Osher program.

I have told people that I am in my 60’s and for the first time I am reading and enjoying a Shakespeare play. Sure, I actually read a couple of Shakespeare’s plays in junior high school, but today I have the maturity that enhances my appreciation twenty fold. We are never too old to learn, and in many ways my life today is the best it’s ever been. I get to attend Osher classes and expand my horizon.

The gentleman who is teaching *Hamlet* to my classmates and me, Bob Heifetz, makes literature come alive. Like many of you, I am an avid reader who needs to have a good book nearby at all times. I was introduced to Mr. Heifetz when I first enrolled in Osher classes two years ago. I took his course on *Huckleberry Finn*, Mark Twain’s American classic and a book I read and enjoyed way back as an eighth grade student. Reading it anew thanks to Mr. Heifetz and the stimulating class discussion, I shared with family members and close friends how good that book was to read. I don’t believe they appreciated my enthusiasm. No matter. What mattered was how much *I* enjoyed being in the class. I was blown away by Mr. Heifetz’s knowledge and delivery. Others in the class shared a similar appreciation for his style and passion. I made a conscious decision to take one of Bob’s literature classes each semester for as long as one is offered. Consequent classes have allowed me to appreciate the brilliance of John Steinbeck’s prose (*Of Mice and Men*), F. Scott Fitzgerald’s masterpiece, *The Great Gatsby*, and other interesting authors with great respect and pleasure.

Indeed I relish the idea of reading and enjoying *Hamlet*. Perhaps I would have gotten around to reading Shakespeare eventually. But because of the Osher program a spark has ignited now! You’re never too old to learn, and I want to take advantage of the gifts being presented by Osher. It’s a special opportunity.
